One of those who is in the thick of Association action through every season is John Ahern. He made his way to the role via his friendship with Rod Grinter, who had just become Chairman of the MFC P&PP&OA. 'I played with Rod, and I work the most with him in this role. We both identify if there is someone in need, talk to each other, and go from there.' It is a great connector, and a supreme example of the influence of playing day links in continuing involvement.

This ongoing connection also speaks to the most important part of John's role; his relationship with the AFLPA. 'I help to obtain support working with the AFLPA and the P&PP&OA, also helping individuals to navigate the system, including accessing Alumni funding. 'We also have a good history of working with the likes of Brad Fisher at the AFLPA, which is really important.'

Overall, John sees the Association as being



'extremely important to support past players and officials'. In these days of lockdown and an uncertain

VALE TONY ANDERSON


Wearing No. 11, Anderson played 75 games for Melbourne, including the 1964 premiership. He was selected for Victoria in the same year, and continued playing until early in 1969. Following his playing career,

Tony Anderson worked in building and property development. We offer our sincerest condolences to the Anderson family, along with friends and former teammates of Tony.

VALE GRAEME WATSON

Hailing from Ormond Amateurs, Watson played 18 games for Melbourne throughout 1964 and 1965, wearing No. 17. He made a steady transition from football to cricket, playing in five Tests and two one-day internationals for Australia. Watson also achieved the rare honour of becoming the

first player ever to represent three states – Victoria, Western Australia and New South Wales – playing in a Shield winning side in the west. Watson then went on to become a successful architect, particularly focusing on sports stadium management.
