FINALS TIME

As we head towards September action, it's worth reviewing Melbourne's form in finals from the beginning of the VFL in 1897, through to the start of the 2022 finals.

Overall, Melbourne has played in 90 finals, with 54 wins and 34 losses. The team that the Demons have played the most in finals is Collingwood, with 16 wins for Melbourne (including six premierships), and just five losses.

Throughout the history of the V/ AFL competition, the Demons have played in just two drawn finals games. The first was a semi-final against Collingwood in 1928, when each team scored 9.8.62 apiece, playing in front of a crowd of 41,423 at the MCG. The game was replayed the following week, with Melbourne unfortunately losing by just four points.

The other draw is much better known, being the Grand Final encounter with Essendon in 1948. The Bombers kicked 7.27.69 to Melbourne's 10.9.69, forcing a replay the following week. The Demons came through with

the victory on this occasion,

running out premiers by 39 points.

When playing South Melbourne/ Sydney Swans, the ledger stands at one win apiece. The first was an unfortunate Preliminary Final loss in 1936. However, redemption came in 1987, when the Demons thrashed the

> Swans by 76 points in front of 80,292 at the MCG. Robert Flower led the way on the day, scoring four goals in his second ever final.

> > Now, red and blue is set to take on red and white at the MCG, as the 2022 finals head back home.

AFLPA - JOHN AHERN

In his role as the MFC P&PP&OA's liaison with the AFLPA, John Ahern has provided us with the most recent information regarding the AFLPA. We encourage everyone involved with the P&PP&OA to become as conversant as possible with these details; even if you are not eligible yourself to become an AFLPA Alumni member, you may be able to assist someone in the wider AFL community who needs to know more.

BACKGROUND

As part of the most recent men's CBA negotiations, the AFLPA secured an annual amount of \$4.2M to fund our Alumni program. This money comes from the current players' share of industry revenue and as such effectively comes from the current players.

Prior to the agreement of this CBA in 2017, funding for past players was only **\$250,000 per year**. This CBA has provided a significant step forward in the support provided.

SUPPORT PROVIDED

There are **four main financial support programs** provided to Alumni members:

Lifetime Health Care Program

Assists Alumni members with reimbursement for **out-of-pocket medical expenses** (up to \$8,000 per procedure) for any **joint surgery** or **dental injury** incurred while training or playing with a VFL/AFL or AFLW club. The aim of the LHCP is to ease the financial burden on Alumni members who require joint surgery and to provide longer-term medical support. Alumni also have

access to free (bulk billed) visits to our associated GPs nationwide.

Football Ending Injury (FEI) Payment

Players who exit the game due to an injury sustained during their employment as an AFL footballer, which will prevent them from playing at senior level in any competition again, can apply for a Football-Ending Injury Payment. Where eligibility is confirmed. payments to individuals are calculated based on age and final vear salary up to \$500,000 for any claim. Only players whose careers have ended since 2017 are eligible for this payment (the payment replaced provisions in previous CBAs which earlier players may have been eligible for).

Geoff Prior Hardship Fund

Assists those who experience financial hardship in retirement. Applications for funding support are **fully confidential** and are assessed on an individual basis. Areas of funding support include mental health, physical health, health insurance, accommodation expense assistance, utility bills and addiction rehabilitative programs, among others.

Hospital Excess Reimbursement

Alumni members required to pay an excess for any hospital stay or procedure are eligible to be reimbursed up to \$500.

Since the launch of our new Alumni program in 2017 we have assisted well in excess of 1,000 of our past players, including 263 during the 2021 calendar year through these four financial support programs.

Mental Health and Wellbeing Support

Hundreds of Alumni members, and their significant others, have been, and continue to, access our National Mental Health and Wellbeing

Navigator service. This is **funded by the current players** from outside the aforementioned \$4.2M per year and is serviced by a **national network on a confidential basis**. 2,032 mental health and wellbeing consultations were delivered to 243 Alumni members, and their significant others, in 2021.

Transitioning Players

In addition to the above, while players are still in the system, we offer a range of services to help them transition from the game including:

- Education and Training Grants

 (available to past players for three years post career)
- Financial education and one-onone support (available also post career)
- Mental health and wellbeing support (as above)
- Access to career counselling
- Annual contribution to the Player Retirement Account (PRA) that is set up as an annuity payment to assist players transitioning from a financial perspective
- Access to **one-on-one support** from our **Regional Managers**, including formal transition meetings and ongoing follow-up once players are retired or delisted
- The option to continue your membership in the AFLPA's superannuation fund after you finish playing or leave the AFL industry. The fund includes default group Death and Total and Permanent Disability insurance

cover up to \$1.19m depending on your age and individual circumstances.

There is a lot we offer to our Alumni members, and those who will soon become Alumni members. It is important to note that with an annual fund of \$4.2M we can't provide solutions for every problem that exists.

There are **individual caps** placed on the funding we provide so that we can **spread our support among as many members as possible.** With more than 5,000 Alumni members, we believe this is essential.

We are about to commence negotiations on a new CBA, and **increased support** for past players is one of our key priorities. We will keep members updated on our progress.

CONFIDENTIALITY

One of the core values of the AFLPA is 'Trust' and, as such, we take great care and pride in **maintaining the confidentiality** of any member who may come to us seeking support. This is of critical importance to us because

without the trust of our members we don't believe you will feel comfortable coming to us.

This commitment to confidentiality means we will not speak about individual member circumstances. At times this causes us problems because we won't talk to the good news stories that come from our support. We also won't refute inaccuracies in stories about support

So that you are aware, our silence on individual player support issues is for the above reason.

1970S REUNITED

The 1970s have had amazing representation at the Association's match day functions this season, and it was no different in Round 21, when around 25 members of Melbourne's Under 17s' 'threepeat' premiership victories in 1971, 1972 and 1973 gathered to celebrate and remember a very significant and wonderful time in their lives.

The general consensus was that 'it



was a great success', as stories and memories were shared going back half a century. Congratulations to Jim Ahern, who took charge of tracking everyone down, along with Adrian Graham and Mark Pritchard. We look forward to seeing you for many match days to come.

VALE NOEL CLARKE

It was with much sadness that all involved with the Melbourne Football Club heard of the recent passing of Noel Clarke, Melbourne premiership player and Tasmanian footballing legend.

Originally from North Launceston, Noel Clarke played 77 games and kicked 155 goals for Melbourne between 1951 and 1955, wearing No. 26 throughout.

After Melbourne overcame transfer wrangles to secure him, Clarke's first game was against Carlton in Round Six, 1951. He had a great debut – including two goals - in what was Melbourne's only win for the season.

In 1952 and 1954, Clarke led the Demons' goal scoring; particularly remarkable when it is considered that he played his entire career with a serious knee injury.

Experiencing patchy form and injury in 1955, and not confident of his selection, Clarke decided to head to the pictures as the teams for the Grand Final were being named. He emerged to find that he was part of the Melbourne side that



went on to defeat Collingwood by 28 points, with Clarke scoring three goals of the Demons' eight.

Aged just 25, and with a premiership to his credit, Clarke decided to retire and head home. In Tasmania, he continued to forge a legendary status. He was instrumental at both North Hobart and New Norfolk, and would later be named as an Inductee in the Tasmanian Football Hall of Fame. He was also named as a 'Hero' for Melbourne's 150th celebrations in 2008.

We shall all remember Noel Clarke for his part in the Melbourne Football Club's story, and offer our deepest condolences to his family and friends.

VALE NOEL MCMAHEN

Part of the spirit of the Melbourne Football Club faded a little with the passing of Noel McMahen on Sunday, 10 July 2022. One of the few remaining players of the immediate post-war generation, he stayed strongly affiliated with the Melbourne Football Club until the very end, rejoicing in the 2021 premiership win, and riding the rollercoaster over many seasons along with everyone else in red and blue.

Born just three weeks after Melbourne won its second VFL premiership in 1926, and originally hailing from Mordialloc – outside any exclusive recruiting zones – McMahen was seized for the Demons by club secretary Jack Chessell. With his eye firmly on the prize, Chessell travelled to the family home by train on multiple occasions to make his case for the one-time Richmond supporter to wear red and blue. His dedication particularly impressed young Noel's mother, and the tough, bustling crash tackler became a Demon.

McMahen was one of nine players to make their senior debut in 1946. playing three games in his first season. He fell ill with Bell's Palsy, which meant that he missed a large part of the year, but then went on to play every game in 1947, being named joint winner of the Most Improved Player award, as well as winning the Best Utility Player award in 1948. This was a special season for the youngster, who was thrilled to not only play in a premiership side, but to also take part in two Grand Finals after a replay was forced when Melbourne drew with Essendon, Remembering the experience, McMahen would laugh at his joy. 'I thought it was wonderful, being able to play in a Grand Final again! Some of my older teammates disagreed with me; they were tired after a tough encounter.'



Maturing into a lynchpin of the side, McMahen was one of only four players to play every game in 1950, and again won the Most Improved Player award. He also played every game in 1951, and was winner of the Best and Fairest. These were trying times – the team only won one game for the season, and supporters were vocal in their distress – but the club was building for great achievements later in the decade.

In 1952, McMahen was only prevented from playing all games by Victorian representation. In 1953, he was named Melbourne's vice captain and in 1954, he came second in the Best and Fairest, as well as again being named vice captain. He was a Victorian representative in 1952 and 1954, and was made a Life Member of the Melbourne Football Club in 1955. In the same season, McMahen was the recipient of an Outstanding Service award. Appropriately, he was applauded by many from across the VFL community.

In 1956, McMahen – by this time best known for his big bumps and speed out of defence - led the way as captain of the eventual 'Olympic Premiers', achieving the rare backto-back premiership feat. In 2004, this entire team was inducted into the Sport Australia Hall of Fame, a wonderful testament to their strength and achievement in this season. This was McMahen's last game, finishing his career on the highest possible note. In after years, he would recall that 'I played my last League game in front of a crowd of about 118,000, many of whom were actually sitting on the field, in a Grand Final where we beat Collingwood by

14 goals. What a way to leave.'

Appropriately, Noel McMahen was hailed upon his retirement in 1956:

'His inspiring leadership, his determination to achieve victory, and his relentless strength so often used to his side's advantage will be remembered by us all for many years.' (Melbourne Cricket Club Melbourne Football Club Annual Report, 1956)

After his retirement, McMahen took up a coaching position with country club Rochester, where his success – including premierships in 1958 and 1959 - led to a stint as coach of South Melbourne from 1962 to 1964.

Away from the playing arena, McMahen resumed his involvement with the Melbourne Football Club as a consistent and determined contributor. particularly during challenging economic times. He was a board member from 1969 to 1973, and in 1975, 1977 and 1978. During his tenure, he also served as the club's chairman of selectors, and director of football. From 1992 to 1994. McMahen was Vice President and director of business. playing an invaluable role in steadying the club's finances. Throughout this time, Noel also maintained a strong and enduring connection with Coterie, believing in the group's importance to the club.

Always a much treasured part of the Melbourne Football Club, McMahen was named as a member of the club's Team of the Century in 2000, as well as an inaugural inductee in the club's Hall of Fame in 2001, and was made

a 'Hero' as part of the club's 150th celebrations in 2008.



A further honour was bestowed upon Noel McMahen in 2014, when he was named as the recipient of the Hans Ebeling Award.

VALE NOEL MCMAHEN continued

This MCC award recognises outstanding service by those involved in the MCC's Sections, and McMahen's contribution over nearly half a century certainly meant that he was a fitting recipient.

Ever concerned for his club even when he was far removed from it. McMahen would share his views on the team, and his hopes for the glory he had experienced as a player. One comment he made that stands true for every team was 'We won as many games off the field as we won on it.' His delight at the 2021 triumph was palpable, particularly when the premiership cup made its way to his Canterbury nursing home. With daughter Annie and granddaughter Katie among those in attendance, Noel hugged the cup that represented so much to so many after 57 years in the wilderness. 'I can hardly believe it's happened', he said afterwards.

Now, even though he has gone, the stories and memories that are Noel McMahen will forever stand as an integral part of the Melbourne Football Club's heritage. He will always be missed, treasured and remembered. To his daughters — Annie, Jenny and Karen - we extend our most sincere condolences, along with his wider family and many friends. As every heart beats true, so Noel McMahen's was one of the truest in the game.
