VALE KEITH CARROLL

All involved with the Melbourne Football Club were saddened to hear of the passing of dual premiership player, Keith Carroll, on 23 September.

Originally hailing from Romsey, Keith was a tough half-back flanker, who wore No. 19 throughout his 58 games in the red and blue between 1953 and 1958.

In a special achievement, Keith played every game in 1956, and was noted for playing 'with the brilliance we all have known him to possess'. In later years, Melbourne's entire 1956 team — the 'Olympic Premiers' — would be inducted into the Sport Australia Hall of Fame in recognition of the players' domination of the competition.

Keith was part of this, and – despite being hampered by injury – took his place in 1957 to play in a second premiership for Melbourne.

In 1958, he again persevered with injury, playing in the Grand Final loss to Collingwood. It was hoped that he would return to full health and form, and be able to continue playing; indeed, the 1958 annual report stated that:

Keith in form is a dashing, brilliant player, and is determined to be back in the side in the near future.

This was a wonderful tribute, but Keith Carroll had decided to hang up his boots. However, he was part of a memorable era, and was one of those who maintained strong connections with his teammates over the following decades. In 2008, he was named a 'Hero' of the Melbourne Football Club for



its 150th birthday, and in 2021, he was delighted to greet a new premiership cup.

With his passing, the red and blue family has lost one of its own. Keith was farewelled with a private cremation, and we offer our deepest condolences to his wife, Edna, to his son, Rob, and to his five grandchildren and nine greatgrandchildren.

CONGRATULATIONS

BOOK REVIEW BETWEEN THE FLAGS: MAKING SENSE OF 57 YEARS OF HEARTACHE

Since September 2021, Ian Munro has been living the dream that most Melbourne supporters have enjoyed: supporting the reigning premiers for the first time in 57 years.

It's been a long and sometimes tortuous journey for all involved, from the middle of the arena to everyone sitting in the stands. As someone who has seen the story unfold, Munro delivers a range of perspectives. He is able to traverse the end of the 1960s, when - as a student – he took 'some solace in examining the reserves ladder. That was where Melbourne was still winning.' (p. 71) At the same time, his ongoing interaction with club figures and events means that he can also deliver the perspective of those more closely involved in these tumultuous and trying times.

One fascinating example is that of Ray Biffin, recruited from Tasmania in 1968 and connecting generations of Melbourne people as he recalls 'Checker' Hughes conferring with him after an incident at Waverley, saying:

"Checker grabbed me and said to me, "Biff, we need someone like you playing in the seniors. We've got nobody who's prepared to use their body and look after any of the players. We need you to become that sort of player." Which is something I had never been asked to do before or had to do...So Biffin became the player the club needed him to be, and

made himself into a cult hero before anyone had heard of the term. (p. 71)

Forces that have created headaches for everyone involved with Melbourne over 57 seasons naturally include the merger mayhem of 1996, when even then first year player Andrew Leoncelli 'told all my friends they had to come because of it could be my last game.' (p. 166) This was the 'merger game', which saw Hawthorn narrowly defeat Melbourne mere weeks before the membership vote.


Following this, the appointment

of Neale Daniher as coach at the end of 1997, complemented by Danny Corcoran as football manager, gave hope to the many, but highlighted the challenges faced by Melbourne players in inadequate and overcrowded facilities, which he recalls thus:

There were machines twenty or thirty years old...Money was perennially the issue at this small club that had this wonderful tradition that they all lived off from the halcyon days, and never moved into the real world of the AFL. (p. 195)

These are just examples of the challenges – cultural, financial and structural - faced by the Melbourne Football Club over many years, and Munro goes on to revisit momentous episodes such as the Debt Demolition campaign of 2008, when 'The club was \$5 million in debt...had won just two of

its nineteen games', and was now seeking to find '150 'foundation heroes' to save the club'. (p. 218) That these people were found is a triumph. That they had to be found - as Munro details - is a tragedy. But that is Melbourne, and that is the 'making sense' element of Munro's investigation. It's certainly not a relaxing or amusing volume; in common with being involved with the Melbourne Football Club and hoping against hope for the team's success no matter what forces may batter it, you find yourself constantly on edge through conflict, craziness



and, ultimately, success in 2021.

Overall, it is a compelling read. Ian Munro provides a fascinating insight into the red and blue world, as well as how the machinations of assorted governing bodies have influenced all clubs throughout.

2022 DANIHER'S DRIVE

Thank you to Jackie Emmerton for sharing a memorable, eventful and sometimes unpredictable Daniher's Drive, 2022.

The highly anticipated Daniher's Drive returned this year after a hiatus of 2 years due to the COVID pandemic. The event is a 4 day, 3 night fundraising drive throughout country Victoria in support of our inspirational friend and Association member, Neale Daniher, as he continues to bravely fight 'the beast' of MND, while raising awareness and funds to find a cure for this insidious disease.

Originally scheduled from 13 – 16 October, unfortunately due to challenging weather events that unfolded across NE Victoria, Day 1 of the Drive was cancelled due to sections of the route being closed and risks of landslips and floods. This meant that participants missed out on a visit and overnight stay in



Myrtleford, Most disappointed was our own local hero Guy Rigoni, who is considered a legend of the region. Under strict instructions from Neale. and an insistence to "Play On". tweaks were made to the itinerary and a "Meet and Greet" event was quickly arranged to bring the Drive family together on Thursday night at the Albion Hotel in South Melbourne. There was such an incredible atmosphere in the room, with participants meeting for the first time, reconnecting and catching up on the past three years. Live entertainment from the Screamin' Eagles, a karaoke competition and Neale on stage for what has become the Drive theme song, "Mr Brightside", were highlights of the night.

With the delayed start to the Drive, Day 2 commenced bright and early as participants made their way to Yarragon for a morning tea mostly consisting of good coffee, local sausage rolls and vanilla slices. A convoy of 80 vehicles and 300 participants was then formed and teams then enjoyed lunch and refreshments in various local venues in Stratford and Bruthen on their way to Lakes Entrance. The support from these small communities who have endured so much over the past three vears, was overwhelming. The Gala Auction and Comedy night held in



Lakes Entrance on Saturday night raised \$200,000 through fundraising activities, which included an amazing live auction, containing some wonderful donated items.

Day 3 commenced with a hearty. delicious breakfast at the Lakes Entrance Foreshore, provided by the local CFA. Following the obligatory team photo, complete with 300 participants, the convoy made their way to Metung for lunch at the picturesque Metung Hotel before making their way to Warragul to prepare outfits for the infamous costume night at Lardner Park. This year the theme was Halloween, and what a fantastic effort was made by everyone to embrace the occasion and get involved. Once again, Neale made an appearance on stage for an incredible rendition of "Mr Brightside". Neale also generously made himself available for photographs with guests in attendance, which was a treat for everyone.



LOOKING FORWARD TO 2023

When the new season dawns, it will also be the anniversary of a long ago triumph. For 2023 marks 75 years since Melbourne achieved a very special victory. It was 1948, and the Demons' opponents were Essendon. That season, Essendon had held sway in all three encounters between the two teams. But, as Don Cordner met Dick Reynolds in the muddy middle of the ground for that most important fourth game of the season, Reynolds suggested that it could be a draw.

Surely not? Don Cordner would, many years later, shake his head in



disbelief. For a draw it was, courtesy mainly of Essendon's grossly inaccurate kicking. The scoreboard read Melbourne 10.9.69 to Essendon

7.27.69. It was the first time that there had been a draw in a VFL Grand Final.

The next week, however, there was no doubt. With no goals in the first quarter, Essendon made a valiant effort thereafter, scoring five goals in the second term. But it was all to no avail, as Melbourne continued to build on a six goal first quarter. When the final siren sounded, it was Melbourne 13.11.89 to Essendon's 7.8.50, in front of an MCG crowd of 52.226.

This was Melbourne's sixth VFL premiership, joining those already achieved in 1900, 1926, 1939, 1940 and 1941. Three-quarters of a century later, it remains a memorable achievement, and one to continue celebrating.



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
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ARTHUR'S GOAL

As regular newsletter readers may have noticed, we recently commemorated the death of a past player called Arthur Pound. In communications with his family, the statement was made by Arthur's son Haydn that Arthur had kicked a goal with his first kick in VFL football.



Upon checking the list of first kick goals for Melbourne, Arthur did not appear. He played his seven games in 1950, which means that statistics are not comprehensive. After consulting the AFL's Col Hutchinson, we found in a Herald report of Melbourne's Round 8 win over Collingwood that Arthur kicked his first goal nine minutes into the game. Given the preceding description of the ball not really going into either forward line, it is considered a near definite that Arthur did indeed kick a goal with his first VFL/Melbourne kick.



Arthur then went on to score his second goal to close the game – as it was explained in The Argus:

Melbourne obtained the winning break in the third term, when they held Collingwood to one goal.

Neither side slackened in the last quarter, the highlight being a beautiful goal by Arthur Pound, the new Melbourne full forward, after the bell had sounded.

With that, Arthur Pound's relatively brief time at Melbourne had started on the best possible note. He will be added to the AFL's official records for his first kick goal achievement.
